Ash Wednesday

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth.

Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, so that we may remember that only by your gracious gift

are we given everlasting life;

through Jesus Christ our

Savior. Amen.

During Lent many work on self-examination and intentional consideration through prayer, fasting, and abstinence. We do this so that we emerge after 40 days with a renewed understanding of the significance of Jesus' sacrifice

for us and reaffirm our trust in God.

We can then celebrate Easter.



Bible Study/Prayer group

Sunday February 9th in Saguache will be the last day of our four week study on *The Overcomer* bible study series. Center's Bible study ended last week. This study series also features a movie of the same name. We will be showing it as this month's movie night film. Please join us for this enlightening movie.

Who was St. Valentine?

In the interest of full disclosure, after about 1,700 years of history, it's kind of hard to know exactly who Valentine was and what he did. The truth is probably not as highly dramatized as we may wish. The truth is embedded somewhere in the depths of history, never to be known until we get to heaven.

The year was 270. The Roman Empire was engaged in a desperate attempt to retain the *Pax Romana* that had endured for centuries. Christianity was active during the 3rd century. Although Christ had died over



two centuries prior, Christians were eagerly propagating their faith and churches were springing up everywhere. But the 3rd century was also the time of the Christian martyrs. Prior to Constantine, the empire was not friendly to Christianity. Claudius, the reigning emperor of the time, was a warlord, intent only upon preserving his empire and routing his enemies. His primary interests were military, and he would stoop to nothing to ensure that his mighty army remained loyal to him.

It was Claudius's maniacal grip on the military that led him to install a very foolish policy empire-wide. Claudius had a problem on his hands when it came to the army. Military recruiting was suffering because of the petulant affection between man and wife. Love was getting in the way of patriotism! Claudius then passed a law forbidding anyone to get married.

Living in this anti-Christian and anti-marriage climate, was Valentine. Valentine was a Christian priest in Rome. He knew from the Bible that marriage was good and honored by God so he took it upon himself to perform Christian marriages—contrary to the law.

Although he was being loyal to his faith, he was flying in the face of Roman law. The Roman government hunted him down and locked him up in prison.

Valentine, true to his bold character, tried to convert Emperor Claudius to Christianity. Claudius demanded that Valentine recant his faith and submit to the cruel and godless tyranny of Rome. Valentine staunchly refused. The Roman Prefect condemned him to torture and death. He was beaten violently, then beheaded.

According to legend (and probably false), Valentine himself fell in love during his time of imprisonment. The daughter of the prison guard met Valentine and fell head over heels in love. As the story goes, their romance was the prototypical saga of steadfast love, broken only by the tragic death of Valentine. He wrote a note to her, allegedly penned on February 14, the day before he was beheaded. He signed the note, "Love from your Valentine."

Henceforth, we have the first Valentine's Day card.

Although the story of Valentine's Day is shrouded in mystery, buried in tradition, and (thanks to commercialism) stripped of its significance, we can bring some of the truth back. The truth is, love can't be squelched, outlawed, or stamped out. The significance of Valentine's life was not that he defended love and romance and performed secret marriages. Valentine—a day now besmirched by cupids, chocolate, and candlelit dinners—is a day founded upon the life of a martyr. Valentine died a bloody death, beaten and beheaded.

The truth is, Valentine was in love with his Savior, Jesus Christ. Love for Jesus trumped his love of self. Valentine nobly gave his life for the God he loved.

Groundhog day



This Holiday believe it or not, has its roots in Christianity like many other holidays we celebrate today. Groundhog day originates from Candlemas Day which was celebrated to bring blessings to their household for the rest of the winter. Families would take their candles to the church to have them blessed. As time went by

the celebration turned into a way of predicting the weather the rest of winter would bring. There is a English folk song that highlights this transition:

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come, Winter, have another flight; If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, Go Winter, and come not again.

This new interpretation of Candlemas spread across all of Europe and when the tradition was brought to Germany they introduced an animal into the lore. In this case it was a Hedgehog who saw his shadow. Because there were no wild hedgehogs to be seen in the Americas, The colonists discovered the Groundhog also hibernates and thus the Holiday that we know of today was born.


Martha Circle Meetings





Heart Shaped Mini Calzones

Ingredients

Recipe by: SugarFreeMom (Allrecipes.com)

- ◆ 1 1/2 cups white flour
- ◆ 1 1/2 cups pastry flour
- ◆ 2 tsps. Baking powder
- ◆ 1 tsp salt
- 1 1/4 cups warm water
- ◆ 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsps. Honey

- ♦ 4 tsps. Active dry yeast
- ◆ 1 cup chopped broccoli
- 1 cup shredded cooked chicken breast
- 1 cup light cream cheese, softened

- Ash Wednesday is on the 26th this year and marks the beginning of Lent and the 40 days of self-reflection.

Directions

- 1. Combine white whole wheat flour, whole wheat pastry flour, baking powder, and salt together in the bowl of a stand mixer; make a well in the center of flour mixture.
- 2. Mix water, olive oil, and honey together in a separate bowl; sprinkle yeast over water mixture. Let stand without stirring until yeast softens and begins to form a creamy foam, about 10 minutes.
- 3. Pour yeast mixture into well of the flour mixture; mix on low setting using paddle beater until combined, 2 to 3 minutes. Replace paddle beater with dough hook and beat dough on low setting for 10 minutes.
- 4. Spray the inside of a large bowl with cooking spray.
- 5. Transfer dough to the prepared bowl; cover bowl with a towel and let rise in a warm area at least 30 minutes (1 hour for better texture).
- **6.** Divide dough into two balls; knead each by hand for about 1 minute.
- 7. Roll each dough ball out with a rolling pin onto the prepared baking sheets about 1/4 inch thick. Cut dough into an even number of hearts using heart-shaped cookie cutters.
- 8. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C).
- 9. Place broccoli in a microwave-safe bowl; cook on high in microwave until slightly tender, 1 to 2 minutes.
- 10. Mix cooked broccoli, chicken, and cream cheese together in a bowl. Spoon 1 to 2 tablespoons filling into the center of a heart; top with another heart. Seal edges together by pressing around the heart with a fork. Repeat with remaining filling and hearts.
- 11. Bake in the preheated oven until hearts are golden brown, about 20 minutes.
