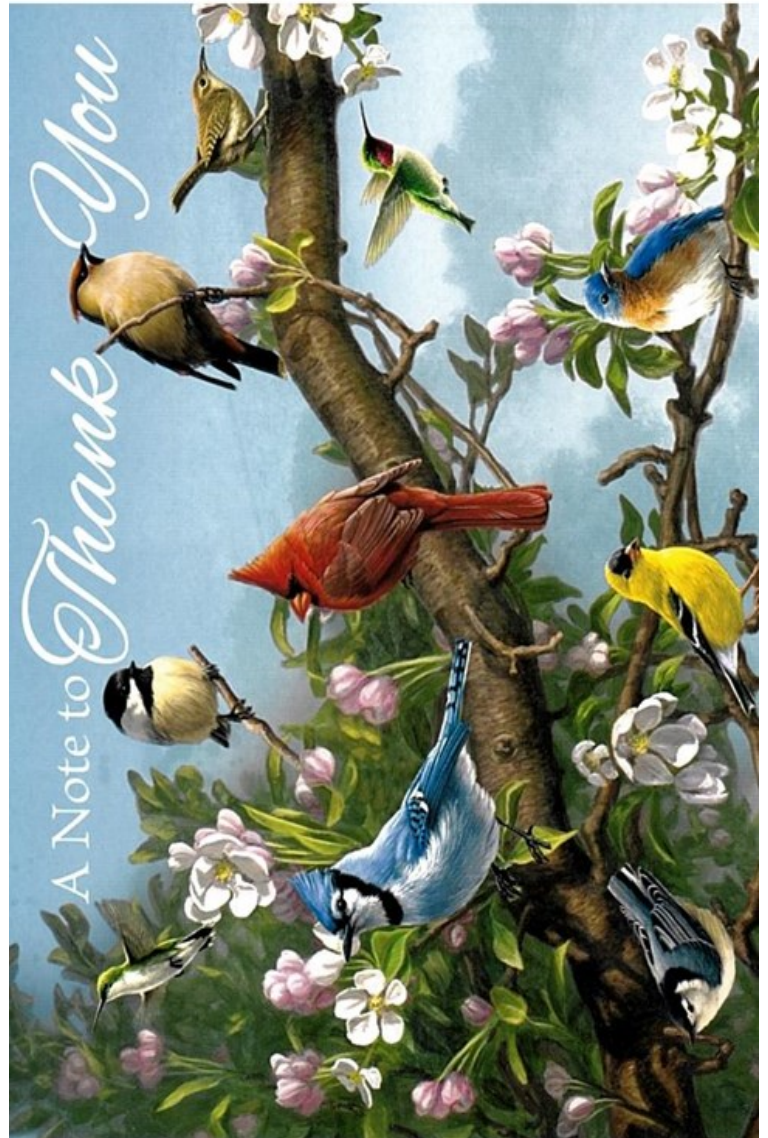

Dear Friends,

With the announcement that Bishop Karen Oliveto intends to appoint me to serve as Senior Pastor of Helena United Methodist Ministries in Helena, MT, comes the bitter-sweetness that accompanies all pastoral transition.

I am beyond ecstatic to return to the preaching life. For preaching is not just one of my favorite things in ministry, it is one of my favorite things, period. The grace I get to receive, channel and pronounce pulpit ministry is life-giving and energizing beyond any other form of spiritual discipline for me. To get to be regularly renewed in this way is an opportunity to re-sink my roots into the stream of Living Water Jesus provides and I am sighing with relief that this replenishment is on the horizon. I have been thirsty for quite some time and look forward to drinking deep.

This said, it is always hard for me to let go of the people in my care... and it is no different to leave the District as your Superintendent as it has been for me to leave congregations as pastor. I have been honored to serve you as DS. It has been a privilege to journey with you through the general ups and downs of pastoral ministry as well as the particular tensions of the past couple years in this conference and denomination. There is something about facing challenge together that is uniquely bonding and I feel that with you.

My sense is that the future of the District is in good hands with Rev. Chris Carr as the incoming DS. Chris has served the Rocky Ford church in this District and other congregations on the "margins" of our conference, including Meeker, CO and Gillette, WY. Thus, he understands some of the tensions between Denver and Not-Denver perspectives. He also has recently been working with the conference Congregational Vitality committee and is excited about coming alongside you and our CRMs to pursue possibilities for vital ministry.

One of the things that had become clear to me over the past year is that with the increased geography and number of churches within this District, the way a Superintendent goes about this work must inevitably change. This would have happened if I had remained with you, as the pace I have been racing at was unsustainable. So, my prayer and request is that you would be gracious with Chris as he transitions into this role. I know you all to be collaborative and generous and hope you will bless him with your ideas for how to connect with your churches and communities in order that he might serve you in ways that are life-giving to all.

I look forward to seeing you at Annual Conference... sharing hugs and hopes for the future. Know that I will continue to hold you in prayer.

Appointment Announcements and Cabinet Transitions

After five years of serving on the Cabinet as a District Superintendent, the Rev. Margaret Gillikin will be returning to the local church as Bishop Karen Oliveto intends to appoint her as the lead pastor of Helena United Methodist Ministries in Helena, Montana. Her appointment will be effective July 1, 2019. We thank Margaret for her many years of service in the Mountain Sky Conference.

"Margaret has served the people of Trinity District faithfully, listening deeply, helping dream, and equipping pastors and laity for their ministries," said Bishop Oliveto. "She brought tremendous wisdom as well as joy to the Cabinet table. My prayers are with her and the Helena United Methodist Ministries as they prepare for their life together."

As superintendent of the Trinity District, Margaret has focused on helping congregations shift the focus of their attention from surviving to thriving through missional engagement in local communities, so that our churches might increasingly embody Jesus' calling in Matthew 25. During her tenure on the Mountain Sky Cabinet, Margaret has become the "Fun Fairy" – not just for the Cabinet, but for the whole Conference – sharing the energy of rejoicing in the Lord always through play.

Before becoming district superintendent, Margaret served as pastor at Salida United Methodist Church in Colorado from 2008 to 2014; First UMC in Casper, Wyoming from 2003 to 2008; and in Brandon, Wisconsin. She was ordained an elder in 2006. She also volunteered in youth ministry as a lay person at Littleton UMC in Colorado. Additionally, Margaret is a certified mediator in the state of Colorado and enjoys painting landscapes with pastels. She looks forward to resuming choral singing, serving in community organizations like Habitat for Humanity and most of all, "delighting in the rhythms of congregational life."

"It has been a blessing to journey beside God's beloved in southeast Colorado, lay and clergy alike, for the past five years," Margaret said. "You have been generous in sharing your resilience and receiving my hope as we have made our way in faith together. Shalom."

Helena United Methodist Ministries in Montana includes St. Paul and Covenant United Methodist churches.

Bishop Oliveto then intends to appoint the Rev. Chris Carr to serve as Superintendent of Trinity District, effective July 1, 2019. The Trinity District covers a large area of southern Colorado, from the mountains of the San Luis Valley to the eastern plains. Chris is currently serving Spirit of Hope United Methodist Church in Englewood, Colorado. He is also the co-chair of the Congregational Vitality Committee for the Mountain Sky Conference. Chris has previously served on the Board of Ordained Ministry as co-chair of the Order of Elders and on the legacy Rocky Mountain Personnel and Policies Committee.

Bishop Oliveto said: "Chris Carr has served the conference well as the co-chair of Congregational Vitality Committee. He brings a deep love of congregational ministry as well as thoughtful, reflective leadership that will assist our Trinity churches as they help their members grow in discipleship and find creative ways to share the love of God in their communities."

"At this historic time in the life of The United Methodist Church, it is an honor and privilege to work with the congregations and clergy of the Trinity District, as well as Bishop Oliveto's Cabinet, to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world," Chris said about his appointment. "While we don't know yet exactly where the denomination is headed, we know for certain that God – in whom we live, breathe, and have our being – is dreaming and moving and pouring grace into our lives. I'm as enthusiastic as ever about the Spirit-led future of the people called Methodist!"

Chris has served numerous churches in the conference, including Meeker United Methodist Church in Colorado from 1998 to 2003; First UMC in Longmont, Colorado from 2003 to 2005; Rocky Ford UMC in Colorado from 2005 to 2006; and First UMC in Gillette, Wyoming from 2006 to 2010. During a four-year voluntary leave of absence, Chris worked as a substitute teacher for Gillette Public Schools and as assistant director in the city's community corrections facility. His ministry with the homeless has included Giving Heart Englewood in Colorado and the town Denver.

"My time outside of local church pastoral ministry has given me a glimpse at how irrelevant our churches often seem in our communities," Chris said. "I've also seen the tremendous potential for getting outside our walls to discover and join in where Jesus is already hard at work. This is how we earn the privilege of sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ with a world thirsty for living water."

Please pray for Margaret, Chris and their families in this time of transition.

A DIVIDED AMERICA: 3 RESPONSES FOR CHRISTIANS

Government cannot fix us. Politics will never heal us.

Those who follow Jesus Christ and identify themselves as Christians need to understand and believe the first two sentences of this article or you will live a highly disappointed life.

Disunity is triumphant in our nation today. Some pride themselves over creating it while others grieve when our nation experiences it.

Division does not honor Jesus Christ. Jesus is always right. In Luke 11:17, Jesus said, "Knowing their thoughts, He told them: "Every kingdom divided against itself is headed for destruction, and a house divided against itself falls."

America does not get an exception to this basic principle. Neither does a family, church, business, or even a long-term friendship.

Prayer precedes every great movement of God biblically and historically. Therefore, we need to pray and ask God for a mighty, great spiritual awakening across America. That is why the National Day of Prayer is a nationwide movement of prayer for America.

Jesus is the Son of God and the hope of the world; therefore, salvation is faith alone in Christ alone.

We must focus our lives, churches, and futures on taking the gospel of Jesus Christ to every person in America and across the world.

We need to stop fighting over secondary issues and rise up together to become the spiritual light in this darkening America and World. The church needs to model loving one another or we forfeit our right to speak into the future of our nation. It is time to come together in unity.

Response #3: Prepare for the Future

What will the Church become in the future of America? Will we lose our freedom or have it affirmed?

We need to prepare for the future realistically, but also with great hope. Regardless of the present cultural tide that is rising in direct opposition to the ways of God, we are a gospel people committed to Christ alone.

That is why I believe our greatest hope lies only in Jesus Christ, His Gospel, and the advancement of this Good News message reaching every corner of America and across this world.

While we call out to God for His Church to be revived by the Spirit and begin to love one another, resulting in coming together in unity, we need to simultaneously pray extraordinarily for the next Great Spiritual Awakening in America. I believe this is our greatest hope in America.
