The Twelve Disciples

Who was John?


John the Apostle was a convert of John the Baptist, but became a follower of Jesus when Christ called him. He and his brother James were the closest to Jesus, and after Pentecost became the pillars of the church along with Simon Peter. This closeness is shown most prominently when Jesus requests his beloved disciple to take his mother Mary into his home while on the cross. He is also present for many of the miracles Jesus performs and is the only disciple to witness the crucifixion.

John is seen as one who maintained continuous faith in that Jesus is the Son of God and is very knowledgeable with Jewish culture. His maturity and spiritual insight may have been what led to his inclusion in the inner circle. He could speak with the intellectually elite of the day while also communicating to the simpler people in ways which they could understand. But he was also human. He had ambition and tended to think in absolutes.

It is believed that John led the Jerusalem Council 50 AD, where the early church leaders and apostles including Paul met to decide how the growing Gentile Converts should participate in rituals and rules of the Christian believers.


He is known as the apostle of love but not because he was soft and loved every neighbor as if they were family. In Luke 9:53-55 it was he and his brother James that were calling for fire from heaven to be brought down upon the village that would not welcome Jesus. His love of Jesus and his dedication to his teachings show us why he is named the apostle of love. For it is not the feeble type of love John teaches but the commanding love that Christ demonstrated to him every day.

"And as we live in God, our love grows more perfect. So we will not be afraid on the day of judgment, but we can face him with confidence because we live like Jesus here in this world. Such love has no fear, because perfect love expels all fear. If we are afraid, it is for fear of punishment, and this shows that we have not fully experienced his perfect love. We love each other because he loved us first." (1 John 4:17-19)

Chocolate Lava Cake

I naredients

- butter as needed
- 2 egg yolks
- 2 eggs
- 3 tablespoons white sugar
- 3 ½ ounces chopped dark chocolate 1/8 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 5 tablespoons butter

- 4 teaspoons unsweetened cocoa powder
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 pinch salt



Directions

- 1. Generously butter the inside of 4 (5 1/2 ounce) ramekins. Place them in a casserole dish.
- 2. Whisk together egg yolks, eggs, and sugar in a bowl until light, foamy, and lemon colored.
- 3. Melt chocolate and butter in a microwave-safe bowl in 30-second intervals, stirring after each melting, 1 to 3 minutes.
- 4. Stir melted chocolate mixture into egg and sugar mixture until combined.
- 5. Sift cocoa powder into the mixture; stir to combine.
- 6. Sift flour and salt into the mixture; stir to combine into a batter.
- 7. Stir vanilla extract into the batter.
- 8. Transfer batter to a resealable plastic bag. Snip one corner of the bag with scissors to create a tip.
- 9. Divide batter evenly between the prepared ramekins; tap gently on the counter to remove any air bubbles.
- 10. Refrigerate 30 minutes.
- 11. Preheat an oven to 425 degrees F and arrange the ramekins in a casserole dish. Pour enough hot tap water into the casserole dish to reach halfway up the sides of the ramekins.
- 12. Bake in the preheated over for 15-18 minutes. Set aside to cool for 15 minutes.
- 13. Loosen the edges from the ramekin with a knife. I nvert each cake onto a plate and dust with powdered sugar.
